This is the group of 15 volunteers who put on 60 tournaments each year while running day-to-day functions of the club. Bragging Rights

Torrey North and South are both on Golf Digest's Top 100 Public Golf Courses in America.

For the first time, Golf Digest recognized both of our home courses as among the best 100 public tracks you can play in the United States!

South is ranked at #36 and has been on the list for a long time. The recent renovation of North resulted in its reevaluation and its first appearance on the list at #93.

How many other golfers can brag that their home club has 2 golf courses ranked so highly?

Tom Weiskopf won his first PGA Tour event in 1968 at the Andy Williams San Diego Open played at Torrey Pines, the first time the 36-hole complex hosted the event that's now called the Farmers Insurance Open. Nearly 50 years later, Weiskopf won the bid to remodel the North Course at Torrey Pines, and he moved from Arizona to San Diego to devote all his energies to the task of making it a worthy companion to No. 36 Torrey Pines South, which, of course, is host to the 2008 and 2021 U.S. Opens. Weiskopf's goal was to bring North Course to the same technological standards and level of prestige as the South. To do so, he switched the front and back nines, rebuilt all greens, relocated most bunkers and rerouted a few holes. As a result, the North is ranked among the Top 100 Public for the very first time.

WORLD HANDICAP SYSTEM



The World Handicap System (WHS) replaced the USGA handicapping system on January 1, 2020. The WHS is intended to create consistency in the determining of golf handicaps worldwide. Here are some of the important changes you should be aware of.

Fewer scores count toward your

Index... Under the old USGA system, 10 best of your past 20 rounds (multiplied by .96) determined your Handicap Index. With the WHS, that number falls to 8 of your past 20 (with no multiplier). The reduction is intended to allow for greater responsiveness to good scores and rewards more consistent play.

Your index updates after each score

posted... Your index will no longer be updated only on the first and 15th of each month. A new index will be calculated daily (or at least any day after you post a new score). This is meant to create a more responsive handicap and keeps players from having to wait up to two weeks for new scores to have an impact. For tournaments a cutoff date will be established for determining handicaps.

Net double bogey is the maximum

post-able score... To safeguard against sandbagging, the USGA system employed Equitable Stroke Control (ESC) to cap the maximum score on any hole. ESC was calculated on a sliding scale, depending on your course handicap (10-19 could take no more than a 7 on any hole, 20-29 took a max of 8, etc.). The WHS also has a maximum, but it uses net double bogey as the universal standard. When you post your own score, it is your responsibility to post correctly using the net double bogey maximum.

Your index will be more intuitive... The addition of a "playing conditions calculation" (PCC) will adjust how your score impacts your index depending on the average of all scores posted at that course that day. Say 20 mile-perhour winds cause you to shoot in the high 80s when you normally post 78s and 79s. The WHS algorithm accounts for this to keep the score from negatively affecting your index, particularly if all

scores that day were high.

Your course handicap will go down...

The formula that computes your handicap index isn't fundamentally changing, but the one that calculates how many shots you're getting from any set of tees is. Previously, your course handicap represented the number of strokes you got based on your handicap index in relation to <u>course rating</u>. Now course handicaps reflect

the strokes you get in relation to <u>par</u>. When the course rating is less than par, your handicap will go down.

Old Formula for Course Handicap: Handicap Index x (Slope Rating/113)

New WHS Formula for Course Handicap: Handicap Index x (Slope Rating/113) + (Course Rating – par)

Examples for Torrey Pines North gold

tees... assuming index of 12, slope of 120 and Course Rating of 69.3:

Old Formula: 12 x (120/113) = 12.7 = 13

New Formula: 12 x (120/113) + (69.3 - 72) = 10

Other Changes Include... In tournaments, stroke adjustments will no longer be needed when golfers are playing from different tees or when men and women are competing against each other.

Course handicap values from tee to tee will vary more under WHS. Golfers playing forward tees will get fewer strokes than before, and those playing back tees will get more. This might affect matches in which you're playing from one tee and your opponent is playing from another. But if you're playing the same tees, the difference in the shots you're giving to or getting from an opponent should be similar to before WHS was implemented.

There are actually several more changes that are less visible. But this article is long enough so those will be explained in the next newsletter.

Grand-Torrey Cup

The second annual Grand-Torrey Cup matches will be held this summer. 2019's event was a very enjoyable and competitive experience for everyone who participated. This will be an annual event and an additional benefit of membership for those who qualify to play.

It will be a home and away event with 24 members on each team. The format is better ball of partners match play. Our home match will be played on Torrey Pines South on Wednesday, July 22 with tee times beginning at noon. The date of the match at the Grand Del Mar has not been determined but will likely be on July 25. Members who gualify are expected to play on both dates.

We had very little notice about the inaugural event last year, so our team was mostly board members and their quests. For 2020 and future years, the team will be made up primarily of members who earn their spot by winning qualifying tournaments during the first half of the year.

The winning team gets to retain a beautiful custommade trophy and bragging rights for the year. Even though we lost the first event, it was an enjoyable experience meeting and competing with the players from the Grand Del Mar. In 2020, focus on qualifying for the event and bringing the trophy home!

Golf Genius Mobile App



After using Golf Genius (GG) for more than a year, board members are becoming more proficient in using the software to print scorecards and score events.

Hopefully, club members are also getting adept at using the Golf Genius app on their mobile phones to enter hole-by-hole scores during the round. Entering scores during the round helps tournament coordinators to score the event. All the coordinators need to do is check to see if the scores entered via the GG app agree with signed scorecards (of course, when there's a difference the printed scorecard has priority).

To run the Golf Genius app you will need your group's Golf Genius ID (known as GGID). Each event scorecard has their group's GGID printed in the bottom right corner of the card. The GGID must be entered into the Golf Genius app when the app is first opened. If you have previously run the app and want to enter a new GGID you must logout then re-login.

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Running the GG mobile app is great for viewing the leaderboard during your round but also anytime after the round. Be sure to copy the GGID on your tournament scorecard so you can check back after the last group finishes. Money awards aren't published until days later but you should get a good idea of where you stand since most tournaments pay approximately 40% of the field.

Pace of Play

Why do we care about pace of play? Here's two big reasons: to make each round a more enjoyable experience; a round of golf is not as fun when the pace is so slow a player has a wait before each shot. Second big reason is when our club play is slow, course management is not happy -



it affects their bottom line. Club tee times given to us by Torrey come with the agreement we will do what needs to be done to ensure all club events are played at an acceptable pace.

Our goal is to play at an average pace of 4:20. In 2019 we did a pretty good job at achieving this objective with most of our rounds averaging between 4:20 and 4:30. However, this average includes those rounds we played on Torrey South when we only had 16 golf holes. (2019 pace-of-play statistics were captured for all club tournaments played at Torrey for which our time clocks were used to record start and finish times).

To enforce our policy goal of a 4:20-round average players get warnings when they finish more than 15 minutes after the group ahead of them. This policy isn't perfect but there are very few other options to identify slow groups. (Club volunteer marshals are used to help alleviate large time gaps between groups during the round).

When a group finishes late (more than 15 minutes behind) all members of the group are sent a slow-play warning email (plus a monetary penalty may be issued if a player has more than two warnings). Many times, players voice their displeasure of getting a warning/penalty when in their opinion they were not at fault for causing the group to fall behind. Please understand, there's no good way to determine who in the group should shoulder the blame. When one player falls behind the group falls behind. All members of the group will be held accountable.

Low Gross Awards

The primary reason our Board exists is to ensure you have a top-notch membership experience. With an average index of about 12, our club is one of the strongest clubs in the county. The weekend tournaments have regularly paid prize money for low gross scores, but the weekday tournaments have not. Starting in October 2019, the Board decided to pay a low gross award in each flight for weekend and weekday individual and partner tournaments.

The Board's decision was not unanimous and, in fact, we would welcome member feedback about this. Those in favor of this think it is appropriate to award gross scores and not just net scores.

Those opposed did not think it was fair to offer additional prize money that only a few members have a chance to win. To address this specific issue, it was decided to award a low gross prize for each flight rather than the first flight only. This means players of all abilities have a chance to win a low gross award.

The prize money for the low gross award for each flight is the same amount as first place low net in that flight. Many others benefit from this additional award as the low gross winner is removed from the net competition and everyone beneath the low gross winner in the net standings moves up one spot.

Low gross awards will be in place for individual and partner tournaments through 9/30/2020. This summer, the board will decide whether to continue with these awards, change the process, or discontinue gross awards.

- Tap Ins -

Lost Ball... the rule for all TPMGC tournaments is the local rule adopted in 2019. If you cannot find your ball, drop a ball no closer to the hole than where you believe the ball was lost. You may drop anywhere on the line between the estimated location of the lost ball and 2 club lengths into the fairway. The penalty is 2 strokes. Therefore, if you lose your tee shot, after dropping in the fairway, you're hitting your 4th shot. Do not replay your ball from the original spot of the previous shot as this causes pace of play issues.

2020 Tournament schedules... are now on the website. Some of the event formats may change but the dates are locked in.


